capacity of the plant is 1½ sacks per hour, and for such a small mill the classification of stocks is surprising; a very large percentage of coarse and medium semolina goes to "A" and "C" rolls, and all the stock is absolutely pure and well dusted. The mill is run on four breaks and six reductions, the roller mills, purifiers and centrifugals being all of Turner's well-known type, running well with cool grinding, dressing and purity- perfection.

The power is provided by a gas suction plant of 36 h.p., of capacity for driving the plant, stones, etc., and still leaving a margin for any special requirements. The windmill seen at the side in the photograph is fitted with stones and is used very extensively for grinding grist for farmers' use. The impression left by a visit to this mill was that it would be difficult to find another of a similar capacity giving better results and that a great many mills of far larger capacity might be found, in which the stock is not nearly so well classified, the separation of good from bad so promptly effected and such a clean finish made. It certainly reflects great credit on the engineers for planning it and on Mr. Rash and his foreman for maintaining the good results and keeping the plant in such good working order.

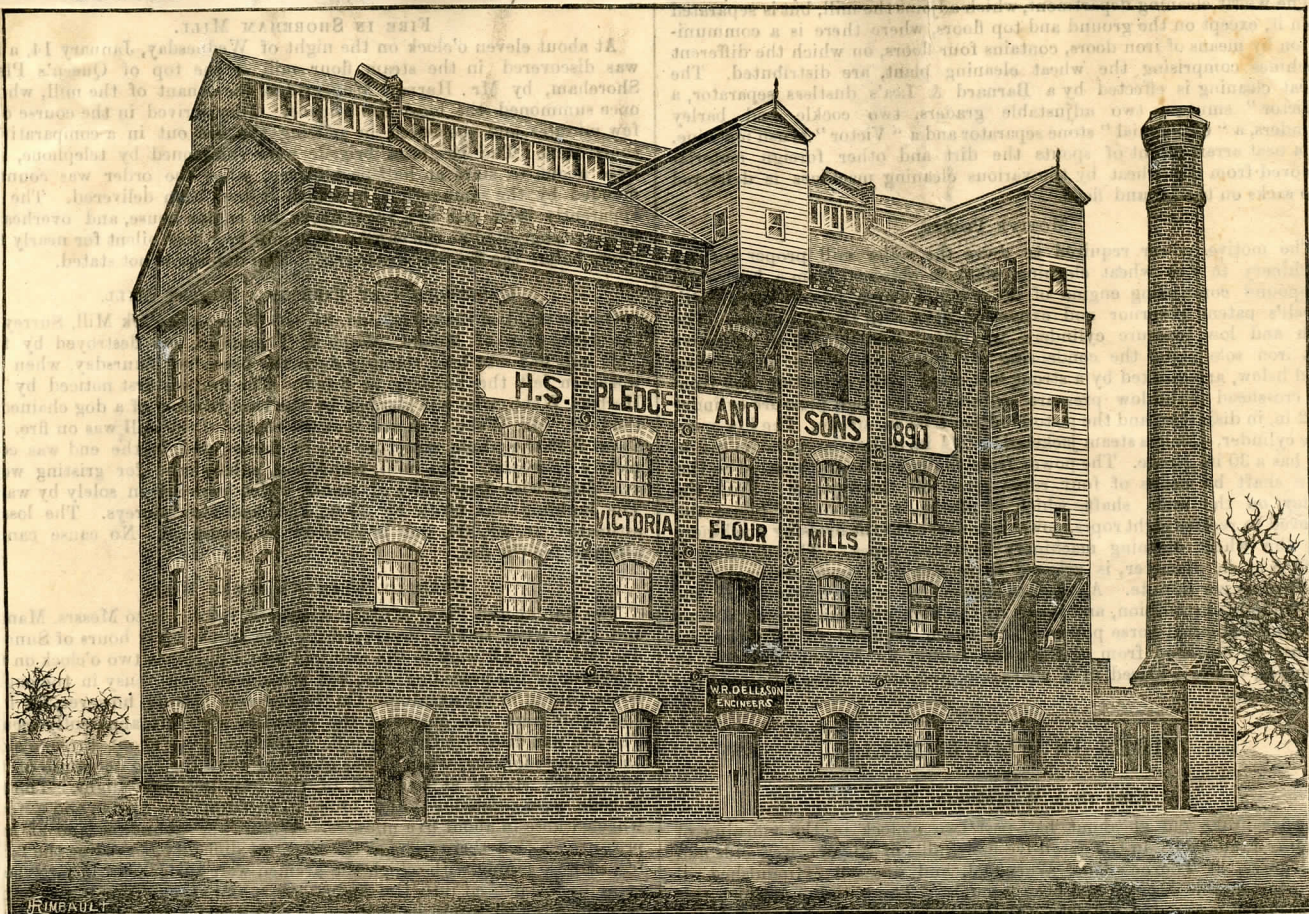

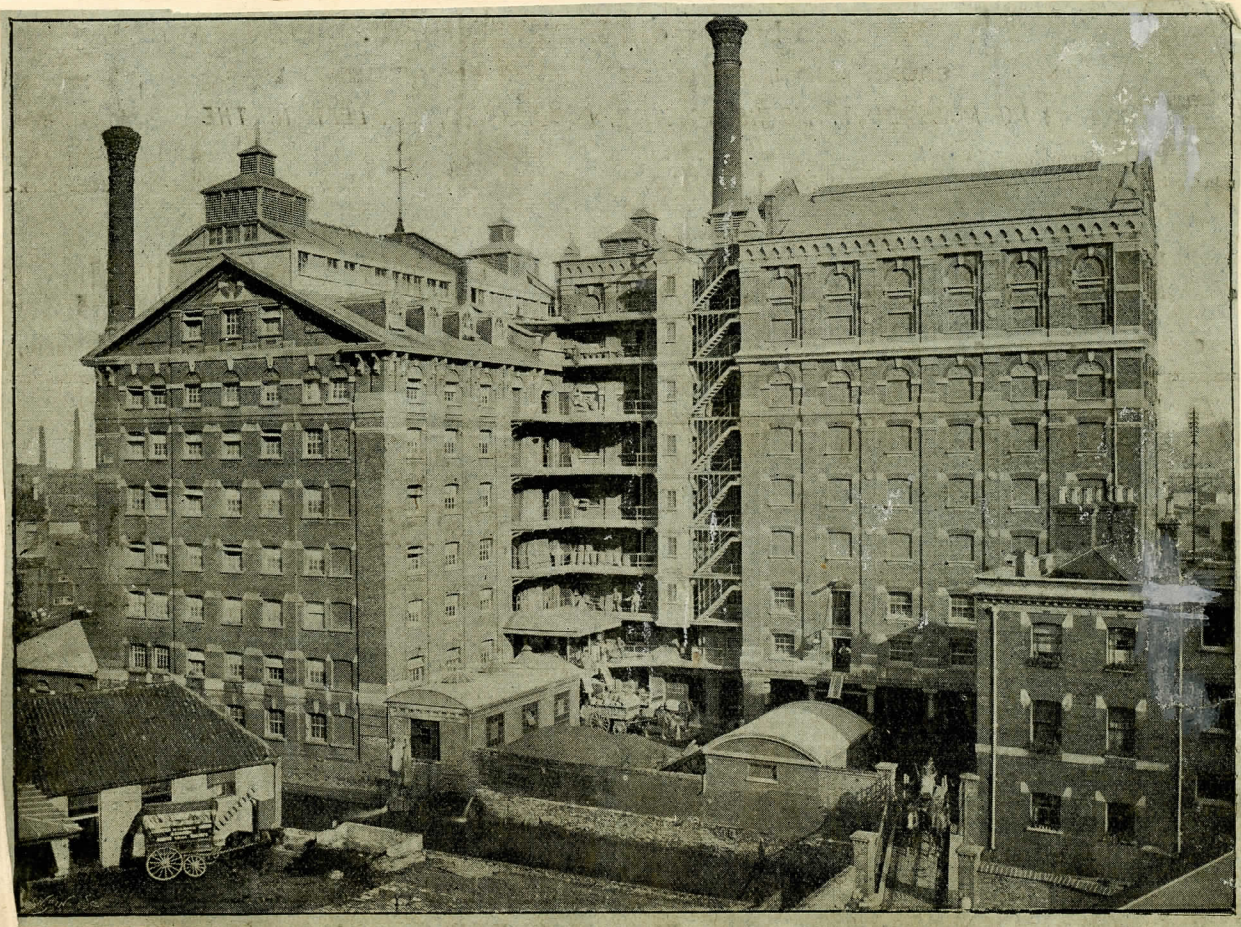
